From July 2013 to January 2014 YoungStar has improved approx. 1.5 percentage points in number of WI Shares **programs** rated 3-5 stars (now at 43.5%) and approx. 1.5 percentage points in number of WI Shares **children** in programs rated 3-5 stars (now at 66.5%).

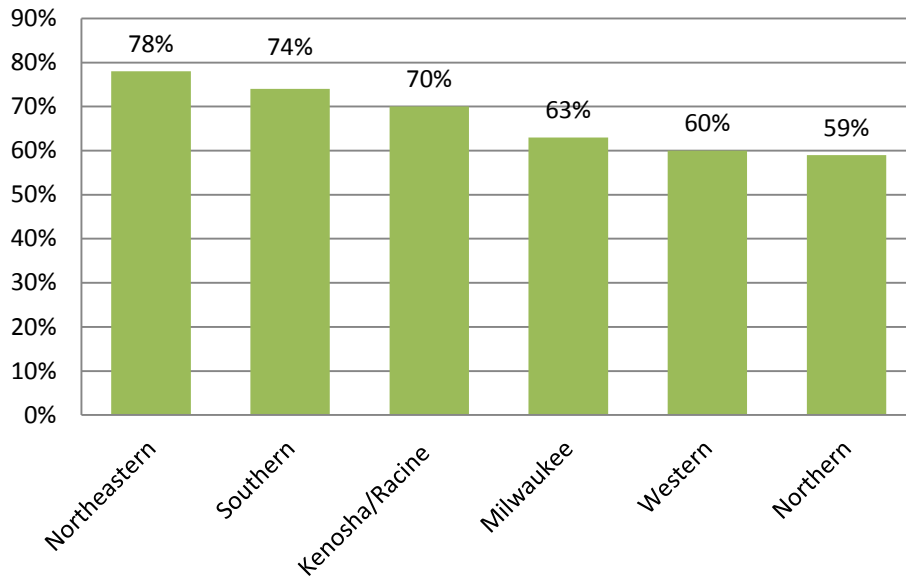
