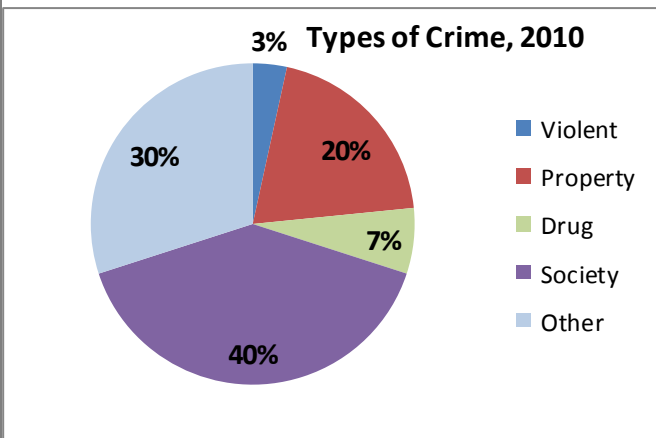




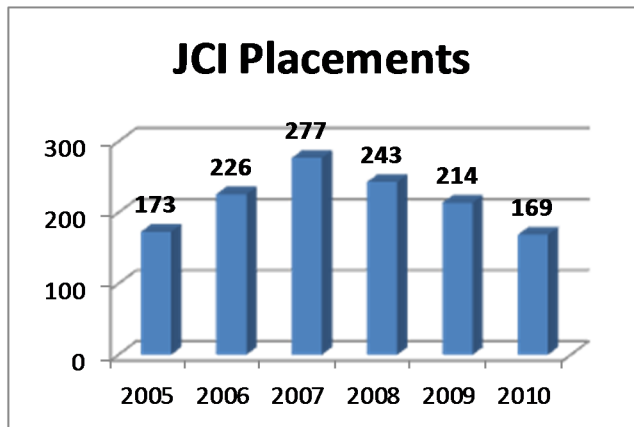
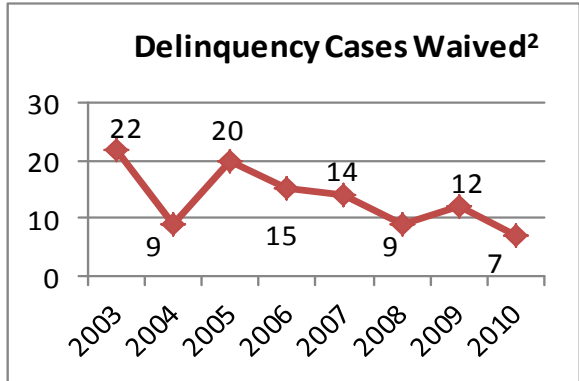
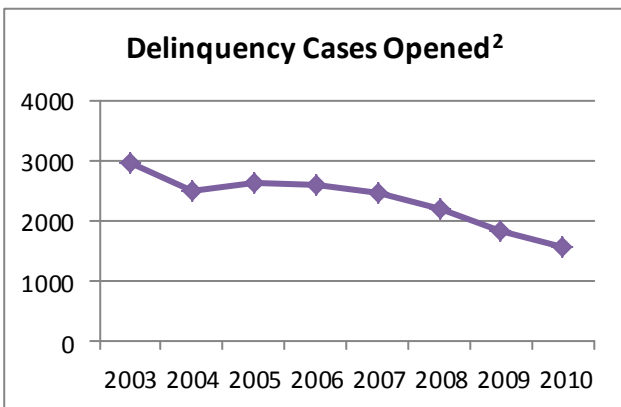
Milwaukee County Juvenile Justice Snapshot

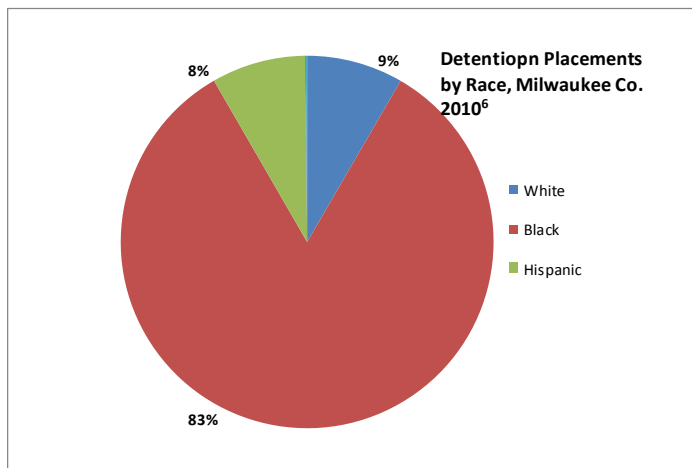
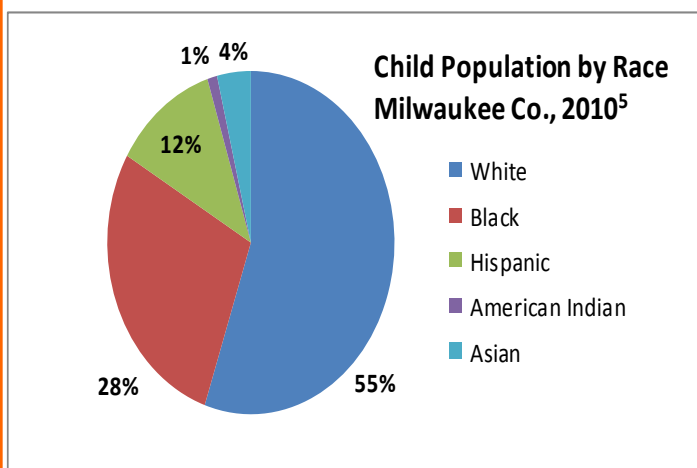
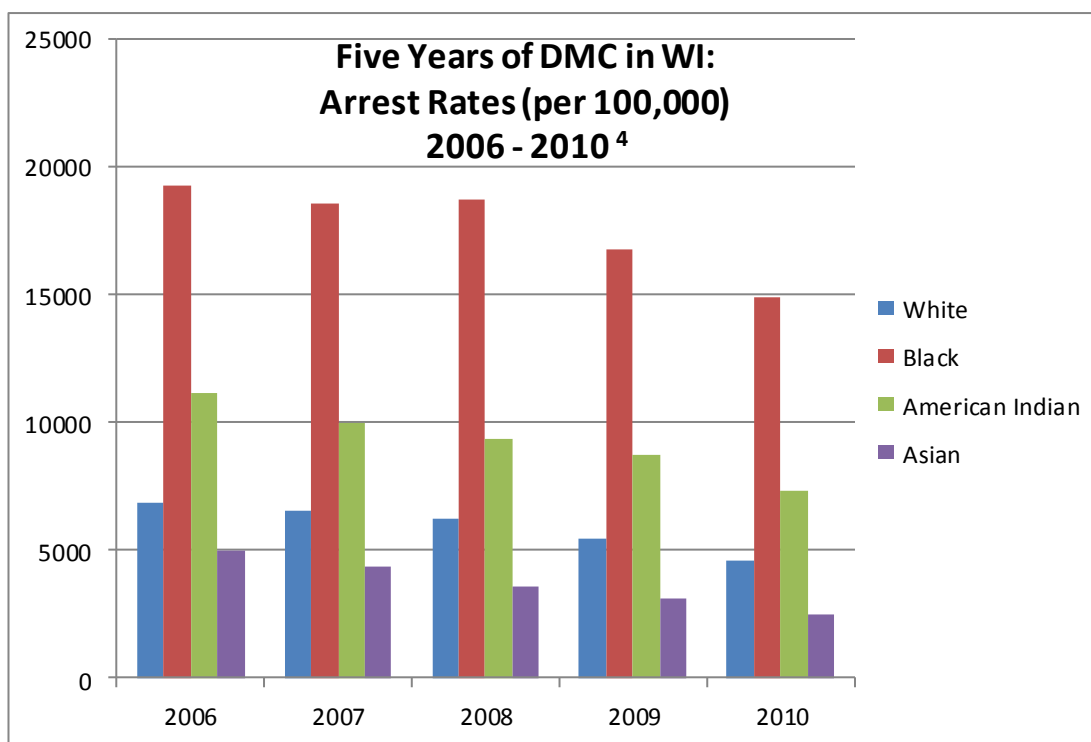
Juvenile placements have decreased steadily for four years in Milwaukee County as more effective interventions are used instead.

 - The juvenile arrest RATE, however, is only *eleventh*⁷ in the state.
- Milwaukee County reported spending nearly \$41 million in 2010 on non-correctional juvenile justice services and placements.**

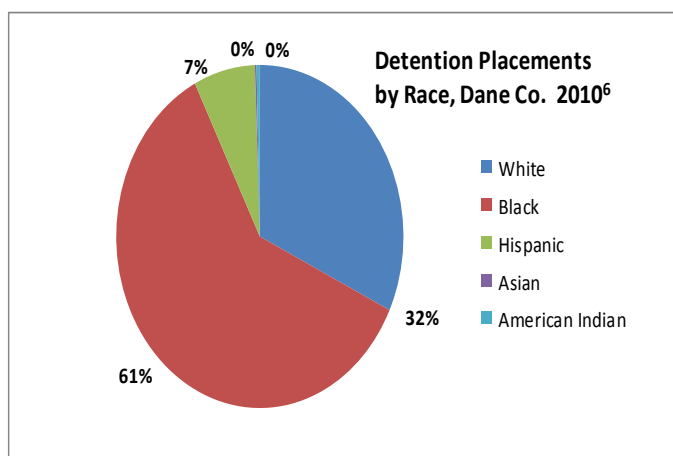
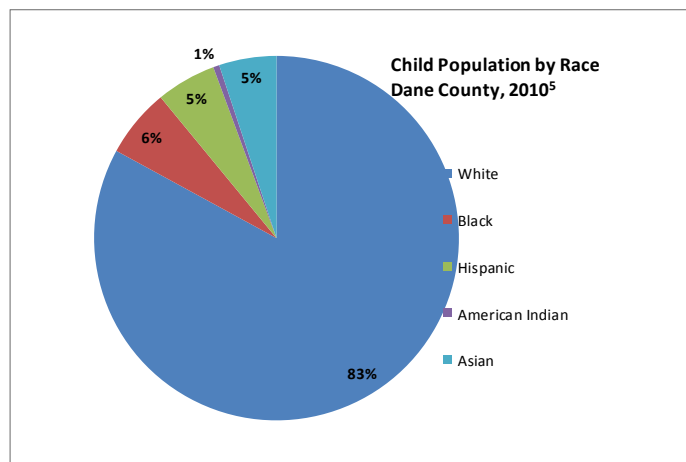
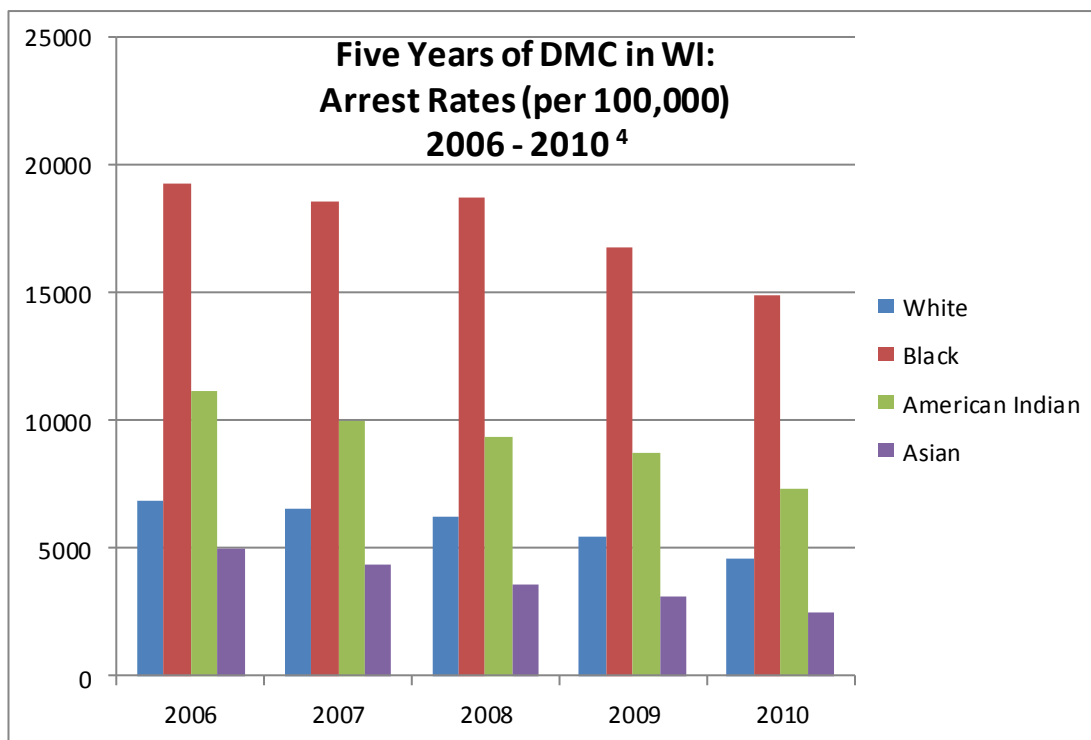
Juvenile placements have had a generally downward trend in Dane County in most recent years.

Juvenile placements declined steadily in Kenosha County each year between 2005—2010. This may be due to both declining arrests and increasing use of more effective interventions.

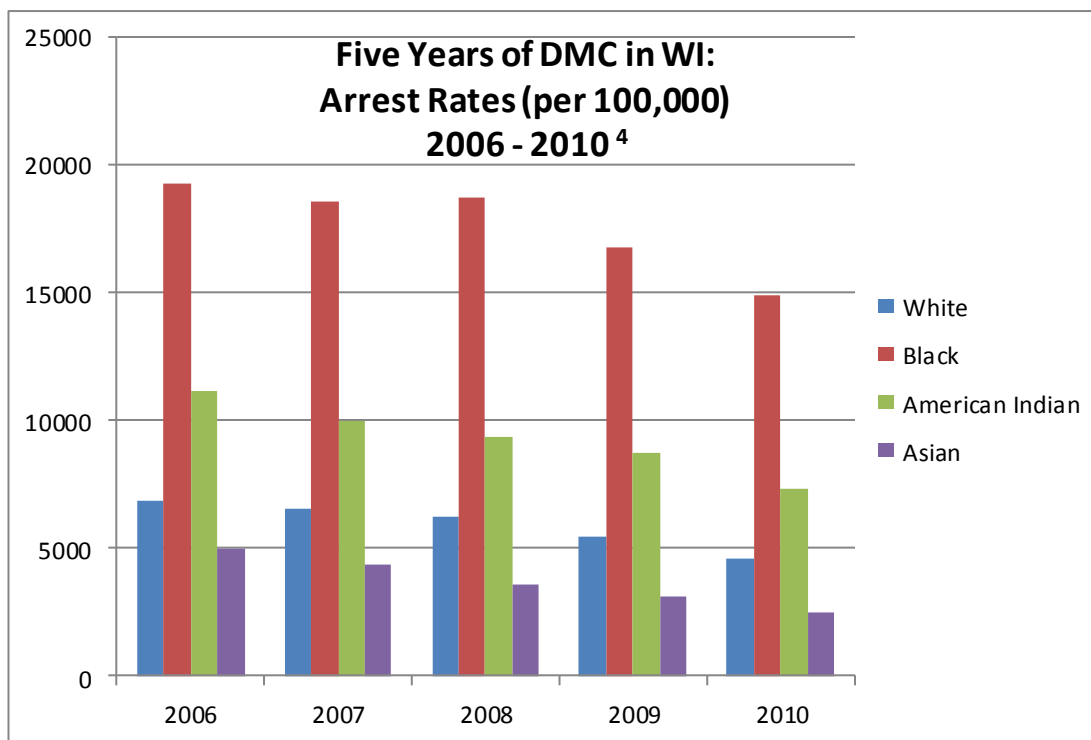
NUMBERS vs. RATES (2010)

Kenosha County reported spending over \$6.1 million in 2010 on non-correctional juvenile justice services and placements.

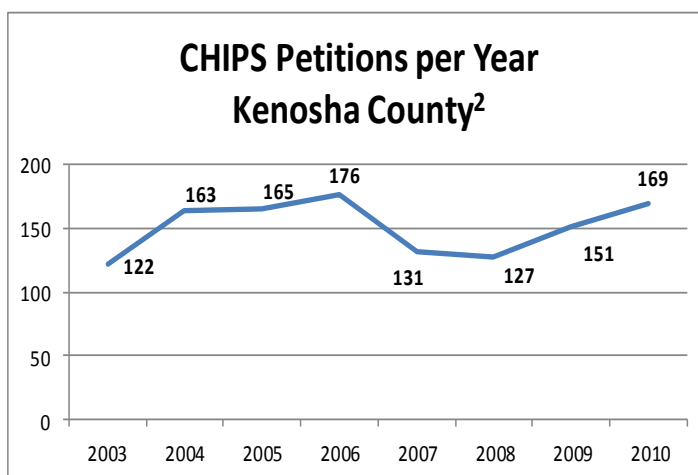

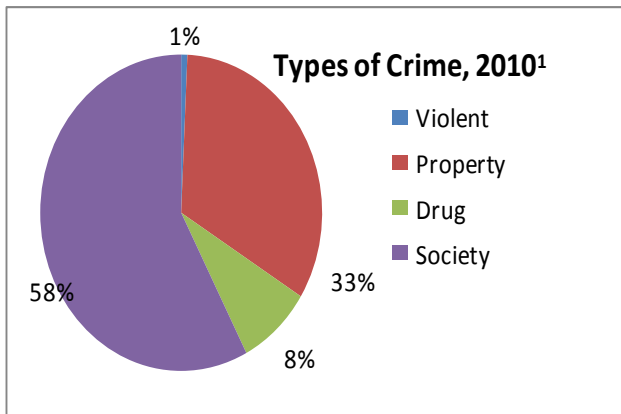




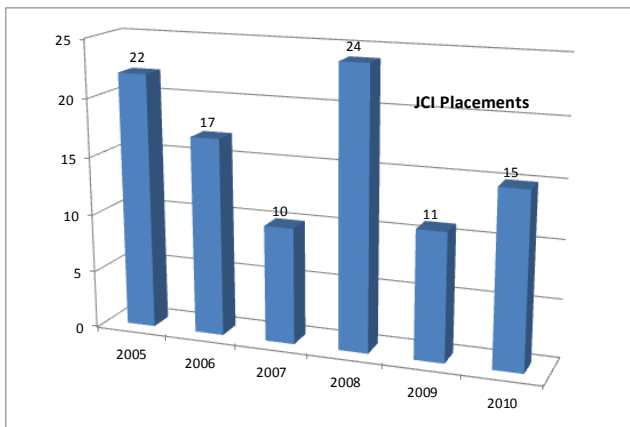
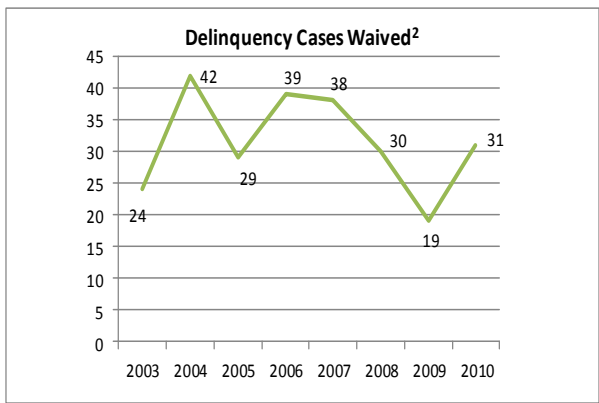
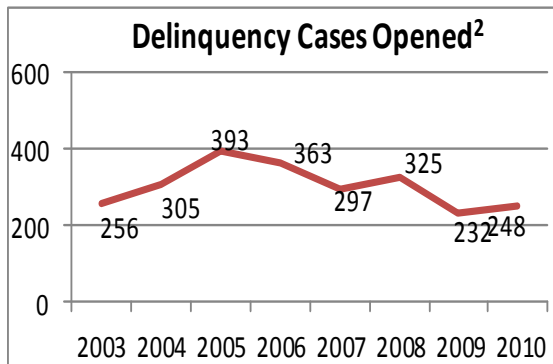
Brown County Juvenile Justice Snapshot

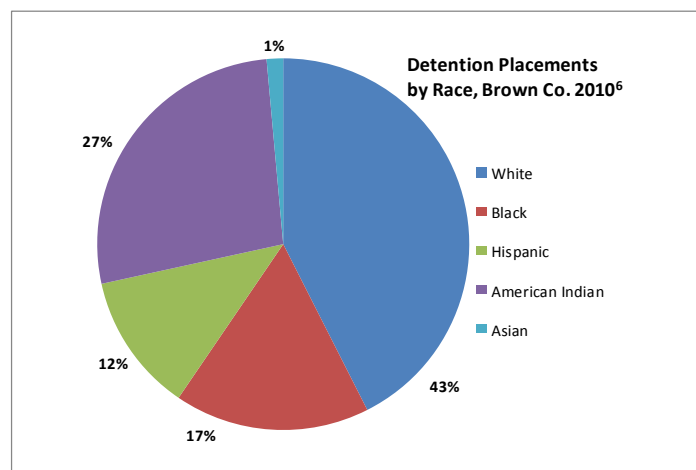
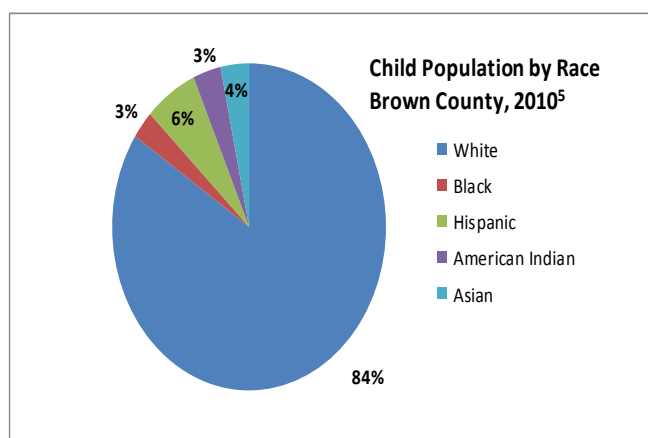
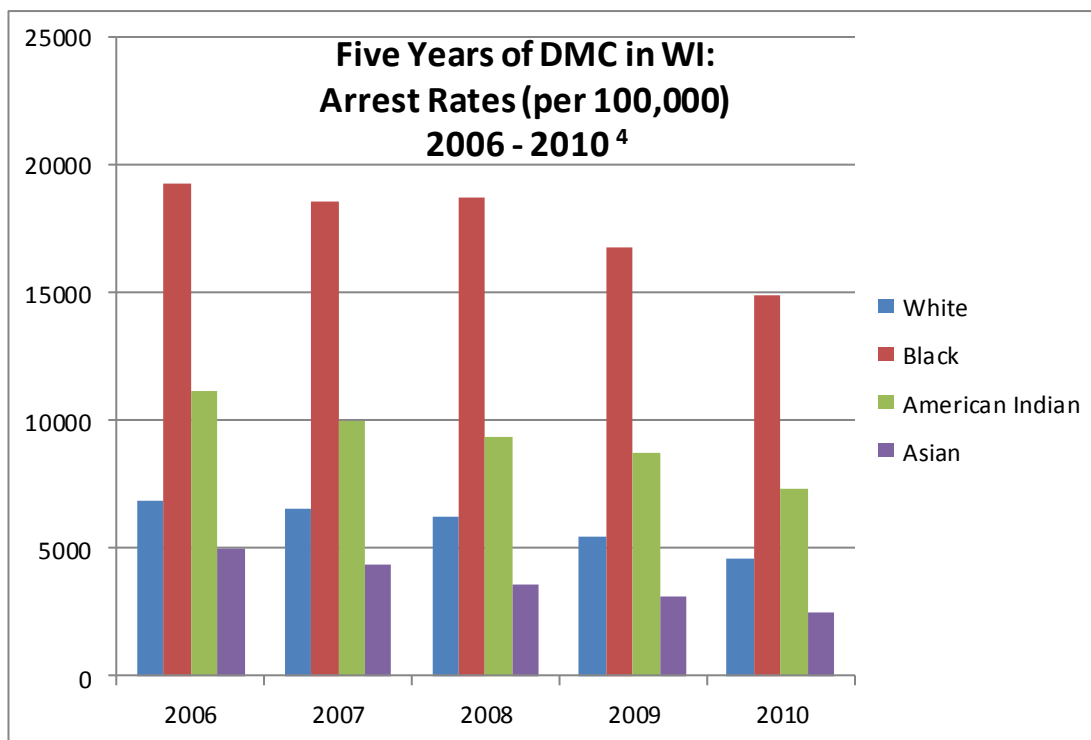
- JUVENILE CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION (JCI) PLACEMENTS³**

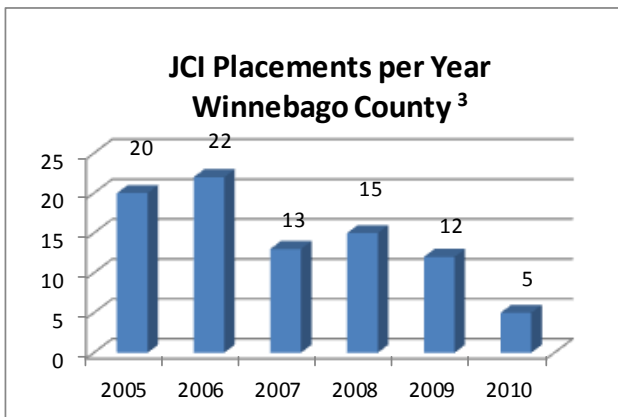
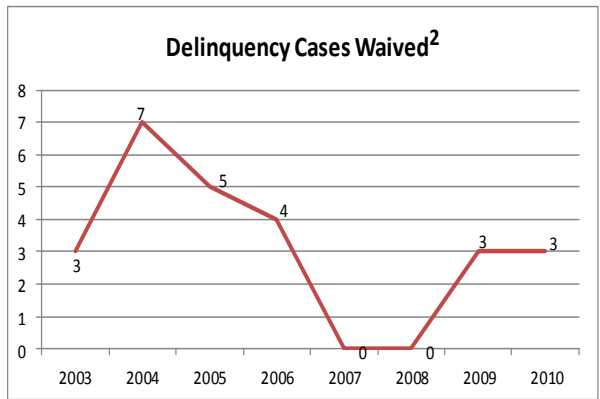
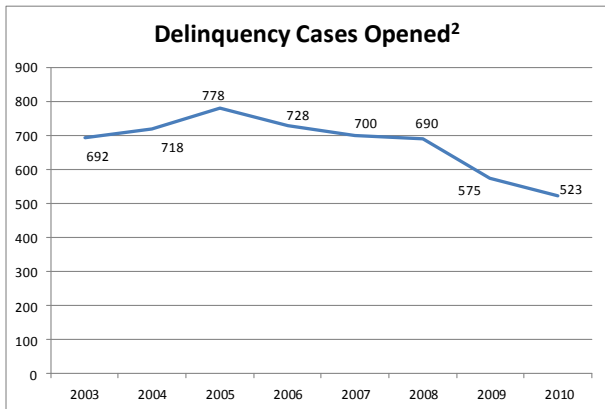
WCCF County Snapshot—Winnebago
